






Last time was years ago, and 2 nurses and I had to hold him down while he kicked and screamed... Bribes don't work, threatening, begging, etc lol. We even tried sedation (Ativan) with disastrous results. :(

[...] we were able to distract our son with his favorite YouTube videos on the iphone and he stopped resisting and could do the blood draw while being restrained [...]

Are you scared of needles in general like having blood drawn or getting shots?

@Eddie, thanks so much!!! Excuse my ignorance but what is Versed? Is it a sedative? And hopefully it is given orally by mouth. I put a call into my local hospital today to see about a patient advocacy dept [...]

The EMLA worked great for our blood draw. He still was scared of being restrained, but when he realized it didn't hurt he was much less distressed! [...]

Susan, try using social stories and role play with him. You can even try getting some dummy needles and play doctor and patient with him taking turns. Let me know how that works.

My son has severe needle phobia. The nurse distracted him and while he was talking about his newest video game, another nurse took his blood and he barely flinched [...] Distract him with a favorite toy, book or story or if he is verbal [...] Hope it helps!



Preprocessing

- Tokenisation = identifying the words
 - "he didn't arrive" → tokenisation → "He" "did" "n't" "arrive"
- Stopwords analysis = removing words without meaning :
 - a / the / it / me / I / do / be /
- Lemmatisation :
 - "sampling" → "sample"
 - "theoretically" → "theory"

"better" → "good"

"fisher" → "fish"

My ds needed to be held down by 4 nurses... then eventually he started asking questions and they listened and it slowly got better. We also get a McD's orange juice after blood draws... that worked the best.





Sentiment analysis (1)

Positifs

- "The last blood draw Andrew did they put EMLA on about 30 min. to an hour before and I thought it helped. The stuff is tricky as you have to cover it. You don't want it in their mouth or eyes or anything and you have to clean it afterward but it did help him. Best blood draw we've ever had. It also helped that we had the top person there -she was good."
- "Well, we got new good techs this time, they did his hand, and it went great. I held him in my lap mostly standing up, cause he wanted to! and his dad has one of his arms, the tech and I had the other, and he didn't cry except when they pulled the needle out. He was a little fussy because he couldn't grab the syringe with his blood in it (it just looks so interesting!), but other than that, did just fine . Yay!"
- "Get EMLA cream, use calming homeopathic or Rescue Remedy, try to tell your son what will happen before you go...maybe with pictures if the language isn't there to explain. Offer a reward to get his mind off it immediately afterward, like a special treat. And good luck."
- "I took my son to Boston Children Hospital today to have blood drawn. He was given Versed 20mg. It worked! He was complacent. First time in a year. No operating room. He was in a regular room. I was so happy... Now he's going around showing everybody his band aid and how he had his blood drawn."


Négatifs

- " My ds has a very high pain tolerance for most things (he can bang his head on the wall for ever, hurt himself etc. and not cry) but the exception is blood draws and ivs, it makes him very agitated and paranoid. He often gets delusional, that they are going to kill him or take all his blood"
- "... He's obviously struggling though, but this blood draw has him worried. he told me tonight that he's scared of it."
- "Last time I was at the doctor I hid under a sink and refused to come out. The time before that I had to get my blood drawn and I screamed and cried and tried to run away. It took 3 nurses and my mom to hold me down. I don't want to be sent to the nut house for it when I'm an adult. I have no control over it, its like when I get there I totally loose my mind."
- "A lot of people are scared of needles. My Ds passes out whenever he sees one and my dd used to be terrified of them and she's diabetic! She had to go for hypnotherapy to cure his fear of needles, because if he didn't inject his insulin he could have died"
- "My son has to have blood work done and I have tried everything including bribery to get him there. But this time he has his heels dug in and will not budge."

Insights

Using numbing / anesthesic cream

... Also find out about EMLA cream. It is a lidocaine cream that numbs the skin to a pretty decent thickness... **makes blood draws a lot easier.**I honestly don't know why they don't tell new parents about EMLA cream--we'll be using it for any kind of needles in the future.Good Luck!!!

This- the EMLA makes all the difference for my little guy. He is still fearful and needs to be restrained sometimes ..

Using a butterfly needle

Great advice above. I would add to request a special blood draw appointment where your child has a private room and can lie down in comfort. Distraction works great, so talk and show electronic games or something interesting during the blood draw. **Ask for a** butterfly needle, which they should always use for a child.





Inform the patient

We've used visuals to help our son understand what to expect. I make sure to bring his favourite toys and books to distract him. You may also want to find videos on YouTube that will show him what will happen at the dentist or hospital. [...] Here are a couple of guides with tips about going to the dentist and having blood drawn.....

Our pediatrician prescribed lidocaine cream. **That and an IPAD did the trick**. Lab people tried their best **with showing him what the tools were**, but too much information can add to the drama. Distraction, Lidocaine cream, and lots of attention on him rather than the procedure did the trick.

Holding arm

Holding arm still as possible helps of course! I thought it would go much worse than that, so I was relieved. There were 2 workers there, one drawing the blood and one assistant to help with holding his arm.

... Try to sit in the chair with your child on your lap rather than lying the child down on a table. If you are asked to hold your child's arm while the phlebotomist does the stick, **HOLD THE ARM FIRMLY**. You are doing your child no favors by letting them pull away from the needle, even though it may feel like you are an accomplice to the trauma ...

- 2. The database of 2.4 millions messages can be updated and/or used for others questions on autism
- 3. Social Networks and Text Mining analysis are useful in order to:
 - better understand and listen to the patient
 - Help drug developpment
